PURPOSE OF COURSE: Classical World Civilizations introduces students to "Classical" civilizations on three continents (Europe, Africa, and Asia) demonstrably interconnected by an ancient world system. Course focuses on essential themes of past civilization: religion, philosophy, surviving texts, gender relations, urbanism, technology, social and political formations.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS: Weekly assignments in SHAW (30 pp / week), Weekly homework assignment in Packback; On-Line Lectures and Primary Source Readings linked via the website, 30 pages per week; All posted images at CWC Website; Class Materials (powerpoints) distributed via Brightspace; Two quizzes, Midterm and Final Exams. Quiz materials include a simple map test (10 ITEMS) and brief multiple-choice questions (25 ITEMS). Midterm and Final Exams comprise a combination of map test, multiple choice, and one long essay, to be

selected by lot. The quizzes and exams will explore the material covered both in class and in the readings, including assigned maps and images.

Make-up quizzes and exams are possible under extraordinary circumstances, but they will NOT follow any specified format and will therefore be more difficult than the originals. Announcements regarding make-up exams will NOT be posted at the website. If you miss an exam for any reason, you need to attend class for details about the make-up.

Late Arrivals will not be allowed to take exams or quizzes (5 minute rule)

Grading is based on a 200 point scale.
