Text: <u>Compose Design Advocate</u> by Anne Wysocki and Charles Lynch (abbreviated CDA)

Purpose of the class:

The fellow at the above left represents a time when writing and reading was an activity to which people devoted their whole lives. Things have changed, but we can still learn a lot from our little monk in the corner. The same books that taught him how to write provide the basis for our textbook and the goals of this class.

Our purpose here is therefore twofold: (1) to learn how and why people write and (2) to use those lessons to become better writers ourselves.

Conferencing:

The conference schedule is designed to give you ten minutes with me individually once every two weeks. Once you've signed up for your conference time and date it will remain the same for the rest of the semester. When you come to conference you need to bring:

- At least a one(1) page sample of your current writing project or a selection from the reading
- A question or concern you have about it

The question you bring to me MUST be typewritten and MUST be at least a half page in length (i.e. a detailed, specific issue); I suggest you give yourself time the night before your conference to think about it. I will send you an e-mail each Monday detailing who is scheduled for conferences that week.

Assignments:

The grade breakdown of the course is as follows:

- Project 1: 25%
- Project 2: 25%
- Project 3: 25%
- Classwork: Assignments, In-class writing, responses, etc.: 25%

Major projects will receive a letter grade and the first two projects are open to revision until the due date of the next project, although a revision can never receive a grade higher than a B. All projects must conform to the standards of a college paper: 12 point font, 1 inch margins, proper identification at the top of the paper, etc.

Classwork will be graded on a simple "check plus or check minus" system.

Attendance:

Your first four (4) absences incur no greater penalty than what you missed in class. Your fifth absence drops your overall letter grade by one, and your ninth absence drops it by two. Showing up to class or conference without classwork counts as an absence.

Plagiarism:

The university views the copying of another's work, whether intentional or not, to be a grievous offence. We will discuss this in class, but let me impress upon you now that it is of the utmost seriousness and gravity.

Late work:

Late projects receive a letter deduction for each day past due. Arrangements can be made in advance for extenuating circumstances, but remember that you must do the arranging. I will not do it for you.

Classwork cannot be turned in late.
